Dressing lines consist of stringing the flags of the International Code from the stem head to the masthead, from the masthead to masthead (where the ship has more than one mast) and thence to the taffrail. All vessels should, as far as possible, be dressed alike. There is no official order for dressing flags but the following has come into use and is recommended.
